Explanatory note

The English language entrance examination program was created taking into account the main provisions of the State Standard of Basic and Comprehensive General Secondary Education, the levels of educational achievements defined in the current foreign language programs for educational institutions of Ukraine, which correspond to the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR), level **B1**.

The purpose of the entrance examination is to assess preparedness and determine the level of formation of foreign language competences in various types of speech activity based on the number of points scored by the entrants **during the oral entrance examination in English**.

The objects of evaluation are the level of formation of foreign language communicative competence in such types of speech activity as **listening and speaking**, as well as lexical and grammatical aspects of foreign language communication, in particular:

- the level of understanding oral speech;
- the ability to identify key information;
- the ability to summarize information received orally and make conclusions;
- the ability to express personal attitudes and opinions;

- the quality of assimilation of lexical and grammatical material;
- possession of the necessary vocabulary and grammatical structures;
- the ability to analyze and compare information, choose appropriate lexical units, synonyms and phrasal verbs, and understand meanings according to context.

The content of the examination tasks is based on authentic samples of standard speech adopted in countries whose language is being studied and corresponds to the areas and topics of situational communication specified in current standard educational programs. The content of the tasks for quality control of the formation of foreign language communicative competence is unified by types and forms of performance and takes into account the peculiarities of the English language.

1. Form of Conduct and Time Allotted for the Entrance Examination

The entrance examination is conducted **in oral form as an individual interview** with the examination board.

The oral entrance examination includes:

- responses to examiner's questions aimed at checking lexical and grammatical competence;
- listening comprehension tasks based on oral instructions or short spoken texts;
- a monologic oral statement and/or dialogue on one of the proposed topics within the established thematic scope.

The duration of the oral entrance examination for one entrant is **up to 30 minutes**.

During the entrance examination, entrants are **not allowed to use means of communication, electronic devices, printed or handwritten materials** that are not предусмотрені by the examination procedure. In case of violation, the results of the examination may be canceled.

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ANSWER EVALUATION CRITERIA

General Requirements

The examination board evaluates the entrant's **oral responses** during the entrance examination on a **100–200 point scale**.

Entrants who score less than **100 points** receive an *unsatisfactory* grade and are not allowed to participate further in the competitive selection. Entrants who score **100 points or more** are allowed to participate in the competitive selection.

In order to receive a positive grade, the applicant must reach the minimum acceptable threshold of **30% of the total possible score**.

Evaluation takes into account:

- correctness and completeness of answers;
- level of listening comprehension;
- lexical and grammatical accuracy;
- fluency and coherence of oral speech;
- ability to express ideas clearly and logically.

The final score is determined by the examination board based on the overall performance of the entrant during the oral interview and is converted to a **100–200 point scale** in accordance with the established evaluation procedure.
